

# Student Headcount Report Fall (2011)

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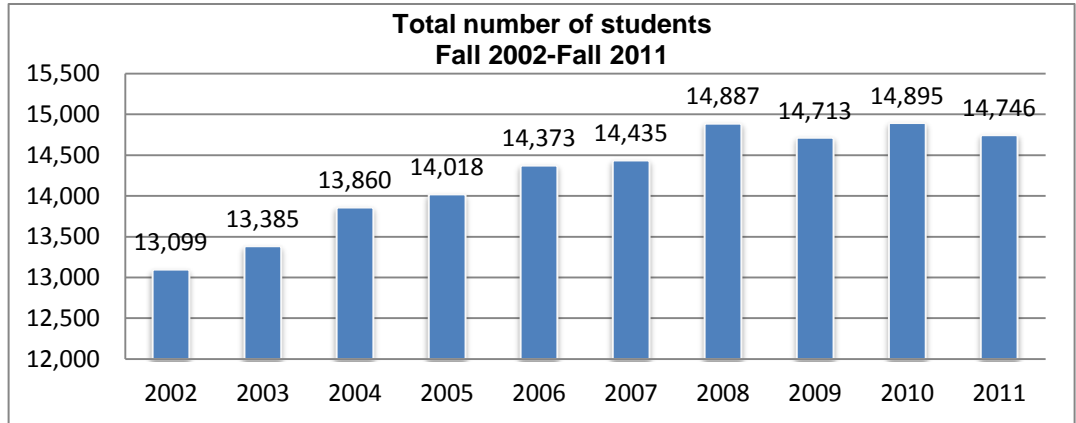

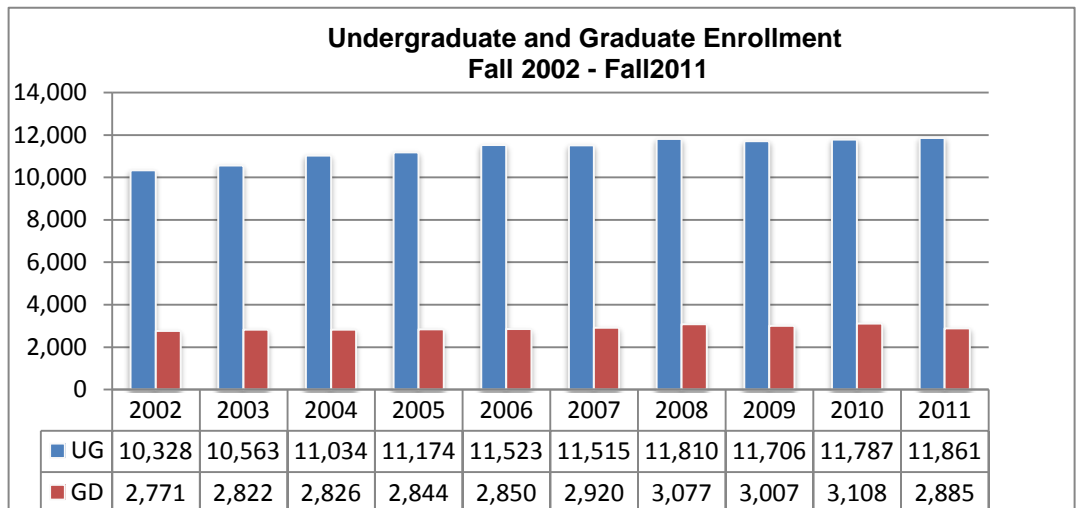
## Binghamton University Enrollment

Total Student Headcount for Fall 2011 is 14,746. This figure represents a decrease of 149 students over Fall 2010 – or a decrease of 1.0%.



*Undergraduate student headcount* is 11,861, an increase of 74 students from Fall 2010. This is the largest undergraduate headcount figure followed by Fall 2008’s figure of 11,810. Regarding gender, 53.1% of BU’s undergraduate students are male, while 46.9% are female.

*Graduate student headcount* is 2,885, a decrease of 223 students from Fall 2010 - or a decrease of 7.2%. (To note, the 3 other SUNY University Centers also experienced a decrease in graduate enrollment in Fall 2011). The graduate student gender composition is 50.4% male and 49.6% female. Graduate students make up 19.6% of the total University enrollment in Fall 2011.



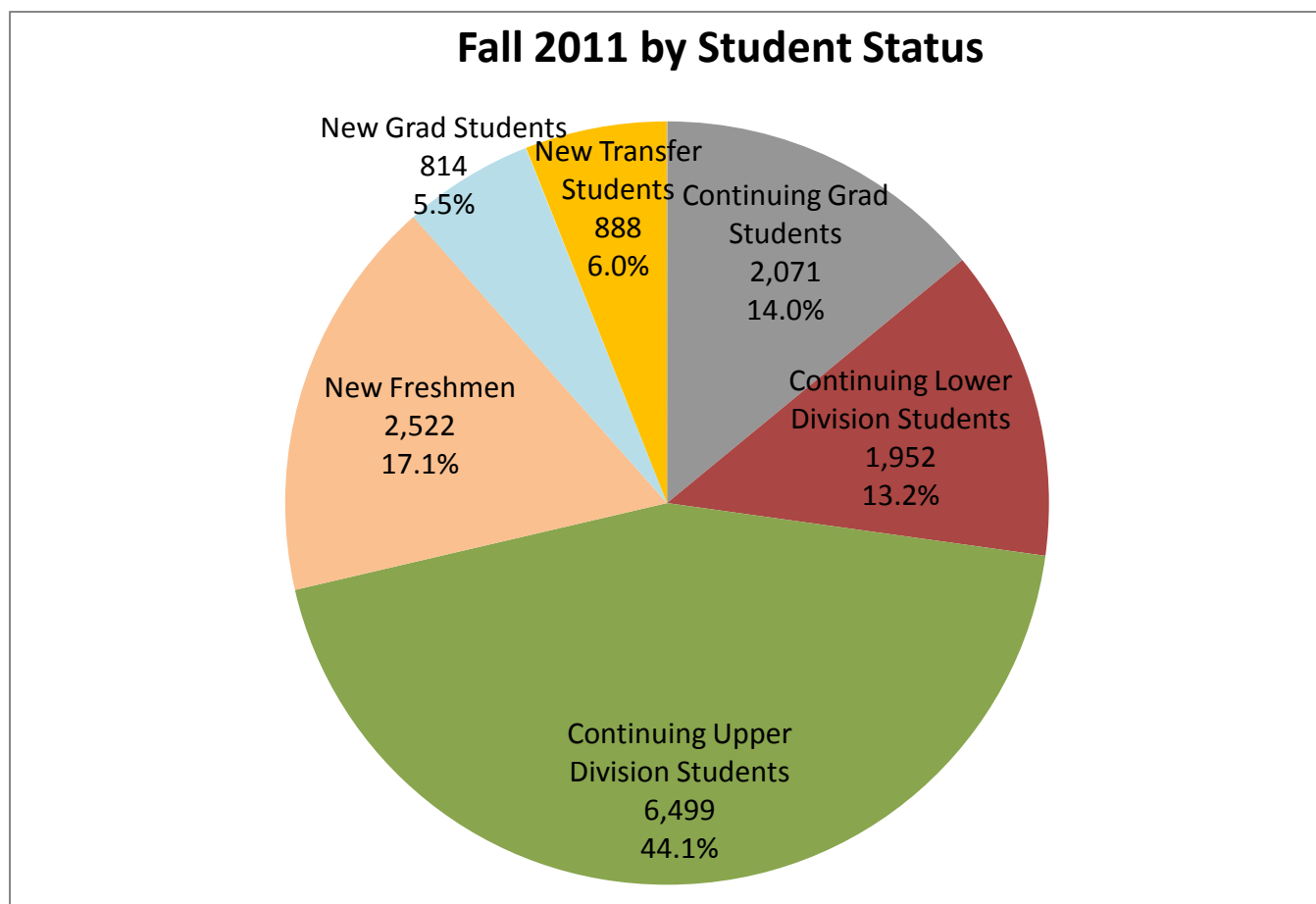
## Enrollment Status

### Continuing Students

Once again, the largest group of students is Continuing Upper Division (junior and senior level) students, with a headcount of 6,499 or 44.1% of the total BU student body in Fall 2011. There are 1,952 Continuing Lower Division students and 2,071 Continuing Graduate students. Overall, continuing students make up 71.3 % of the student population.

### New Students

In the Fall of 2011, Binghamton University welcomed 2,522 new freshmen, 814 new graduate students, and 888 new transfers. The new freshman figure is 8.3% higher compared to Fall 2010's figure. The figures for new transfers (-13.6%) and new graduate students (-10%) are down compared to Fall 2010. New freshmen comprise 17.1% of the total student population.



## Geographic Origin

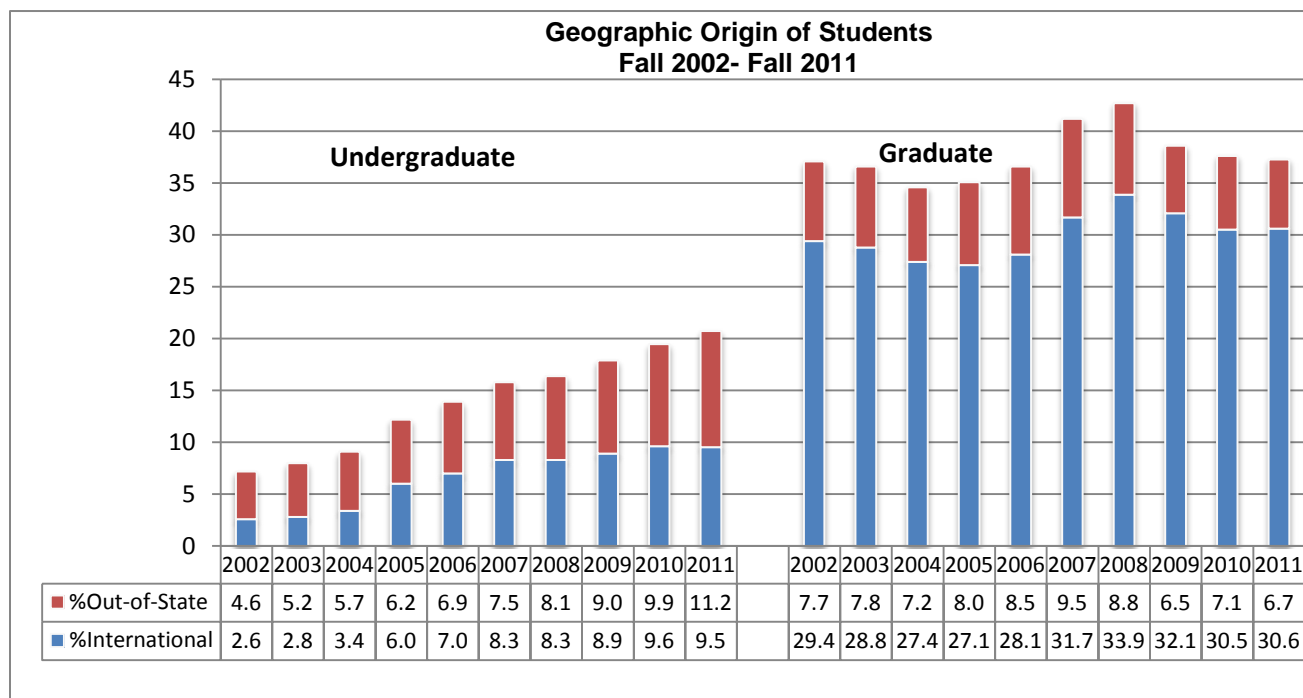
### International and Out-of-State Figures

Undergraduate out-of-state student headcount increased to 1,322 students (1.3% increase from Fall 2010), and now account for over 11% of undergraduates. There are 1,127 international undergraduates, which accounts for 9.5% of undergraduates. The combined percentage of 20.7 percent (11.2 % out-of-state plus 9.5% international) has never been greater.

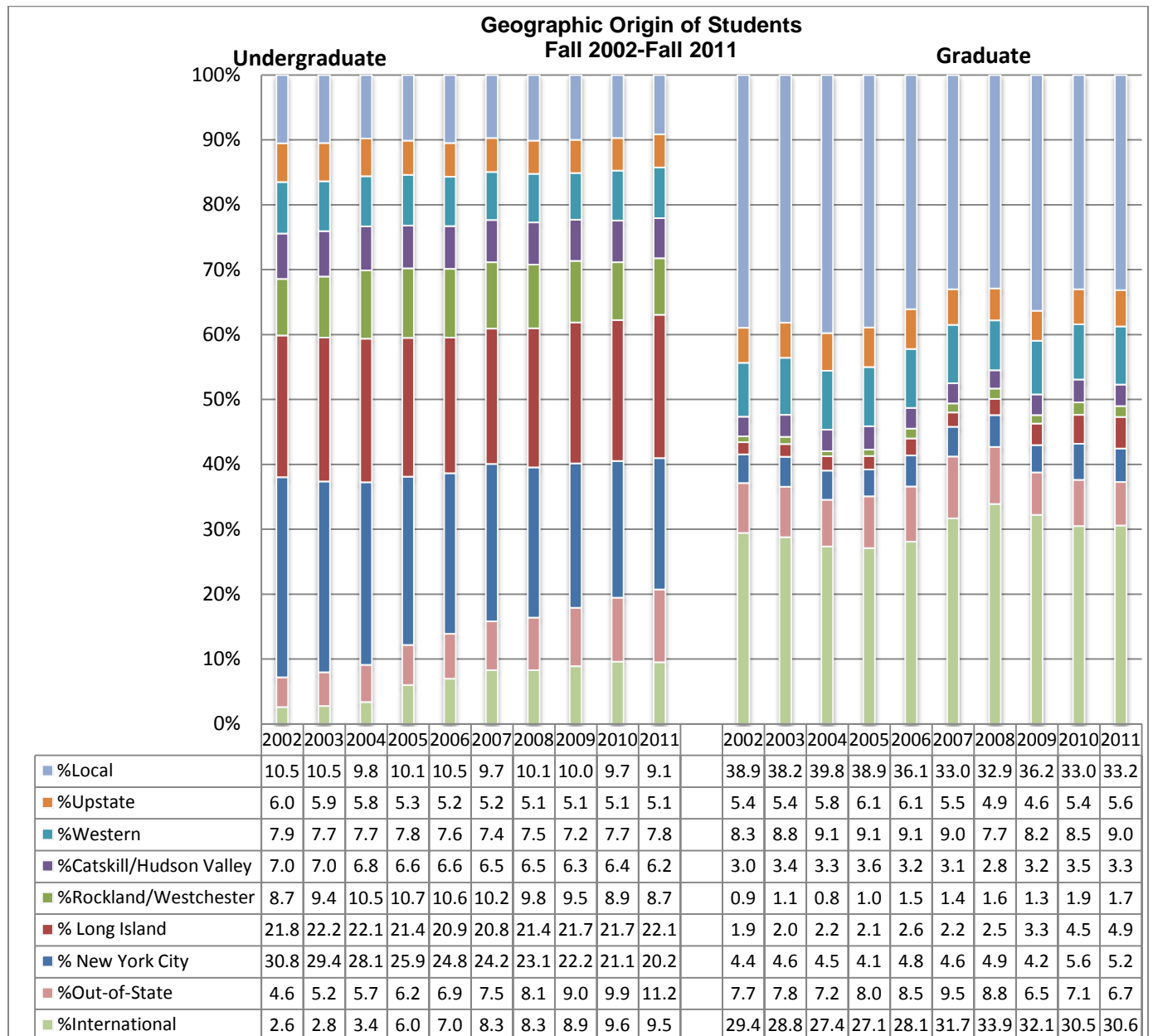
At the graduate level, international and out-of-state students combine to make up 37.3 percent of the population in Fall 2011. For the fifth consecutive Fall, over 30% of Binghamton's graduate students are international students.

Overall (undergraduates and graduates combined) there are 1,992 international and 1,511 out-of-state students. Nearly one-quarter (23.8%) of the entire student population is international or out-of-state.

The chart below illustrates how the percentages of international and out-of-state students have changed over the last 10 fall semesters at the undergraduate and graduate levels. The dual-degree program with Turkey has contributed to the undergraduate increases, but the figure has still increased annually even when not accounting for this program.



The chart below adds regional breakdowns of New York State students. The number of students from these regions has remained relatively constant. However, the percentage of undergraduates coming from New York City has steadily decreased since Fall 2002. In Fall 2002, 30.8% of BU undergraduates came from New York City, compared to 20.2% in Fall 2011.



## Undergraduate Students

A total of 83 different countries were represented in the BU student body in Fall 2011. (For a complete list of the number of students from each country, please see Appendix A on page 11.) In Fall 2011, the most represented countries of **undergraduate** students are:

## Graduate Students

*International students* make up 30.6 percent of graduate students in Fall 2011, which is approximately the same as in Fall 2010.

There were 854 non-U.S. citizen graduate students in Fall 2011 (this figure includes non-U.S. citizens eligible to pay in-state tuition). International **graduate** students came to BU from 64 countries, with the following being the most represented:

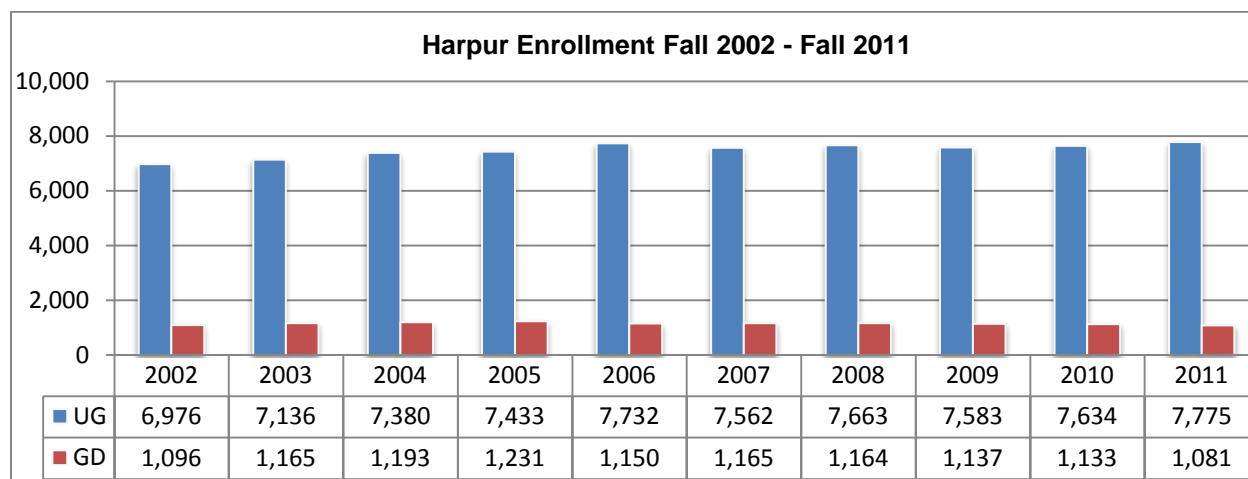

## Enrollment by School

### HARPUR COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

#### Enrollment Fall 2002 - Fall 2011

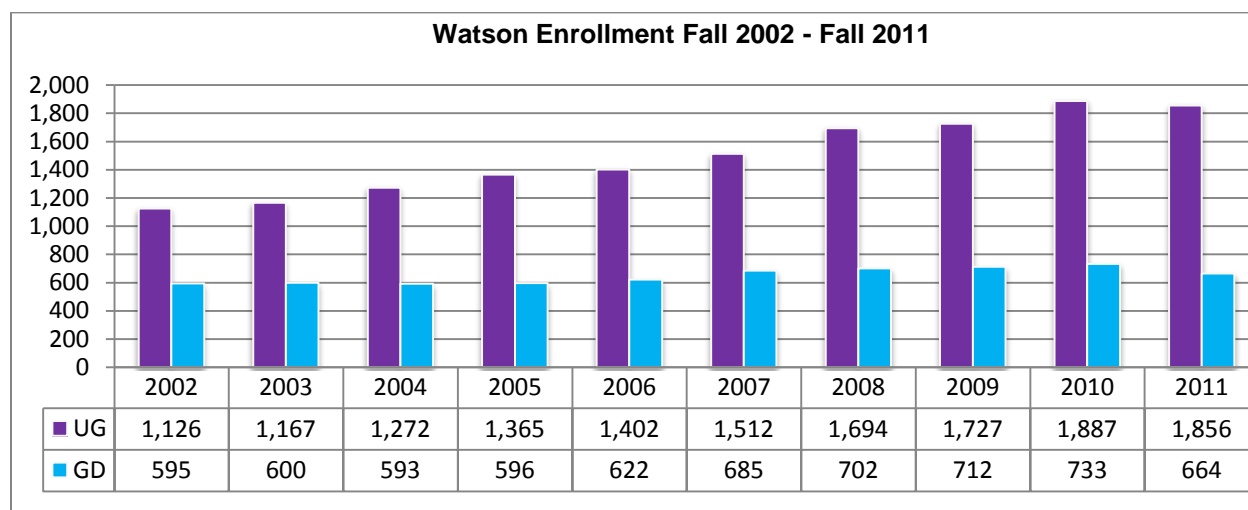
Undergraduate enrollment in Harpur has increased slightly over the past three years and currently stands at 7,775 in Fall 2011. On the other hand, graduate enrollment declined by 52 (4.6%) from Fall 2010 and is the lowest since Fall 2002. Total undergraduate and graduate enrollment in Harpur is 8,856 in Fall 2011.



### WATSON SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING AND APPLIED SCIENCE

#### Enrollment Fall 2002 - Fall 2011

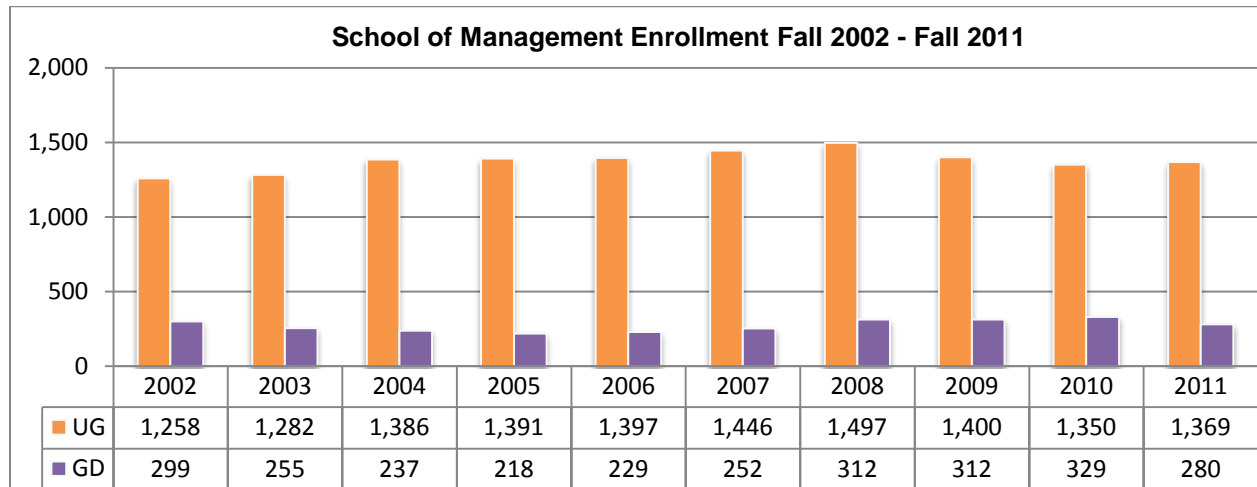
Enrollment for both the undergraduate and graduate levels in Watson decreased slightly from Fall 2010. Undergraduate enrollment increased by a robust 67.6 percent from 1,126 in Fall 2002 to 1,887 in Fall 2010. Graduate enrollment increased by 23.2 percent from 595 in Fall 2002 to 733 in Fall 2010, then decreased by 9.4% from Fall 2010.



## SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT

### Enrollment Fall 2002 - Fall 2011

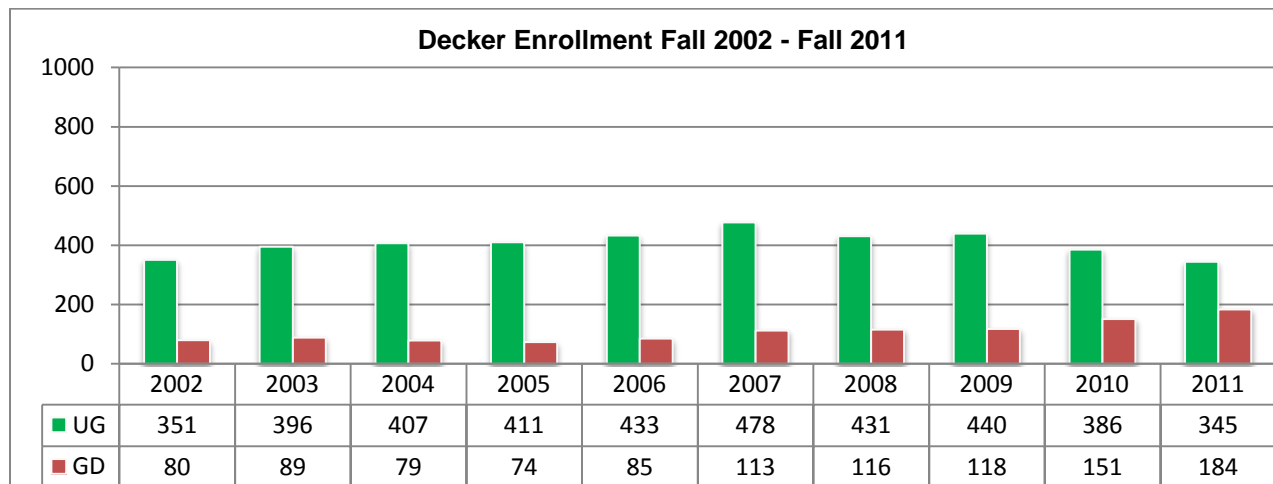
Undergraduate enrollment in the School of Management increased steadily from Fall 2002 through Fall 2008. Undergraduate enrollment decreased by 128 students, or 8.6% from Fall 2008 to Fall 2011. Graduate enrollment decreased by 14.9% from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011 and stands at 280 students.



## DECKER SCHOOL OF NURSING

### Enrollment Fall 2002 - Fall 2011

Undergraduate enrollment in the Decker School of Nursing climbed from 351 in Fall 2002 to 440 in Fall 2009, representing a 25 percent increase. However, undergraduate enrollment declined by 95 students from Fall 2009 to Fall 2011, representing a 21.6% decrease. Graduate enrollment has been increasing each year since Fall 2005, and stands at 184 in Fall 2011. Graduate student enrollment has increased by 148.6% since Fall 2005.



**SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

***Enrollment Fall 2002 - Fall 2011***

In the Summer of 2006, the School of Education and Human Development (SEHD) split into the School of Education (SED) and the College of Community and Public Affairs (CCPA). SED consists of the Education program (a graduate-level program) formerly under SEHD. CCPA consists of the remaining programs formerly under SEHD (undergraduate program in Human Development and graduate programs in Social Science and Social Work), plus the Masters in Public Administration (MPA) program. A summary of the enrollment trends in each of these programs follows.\*

**School of Education**

The Education program, now its own school, had a very stable headcount from Fall 2002 through Fall 2007. Beginning Fall 2007, enrollment in the School of Education steadily increased through Fall 2010 but declined by 9.2% from Fall 2010 and stands at 277 students in Fall 2011.

**Programs in CCPA**

The Undergraduate program in Human Development has remained stable since 2002, ranging in headcount from 473 in Fall 2002 to 483 in Fall 2011.

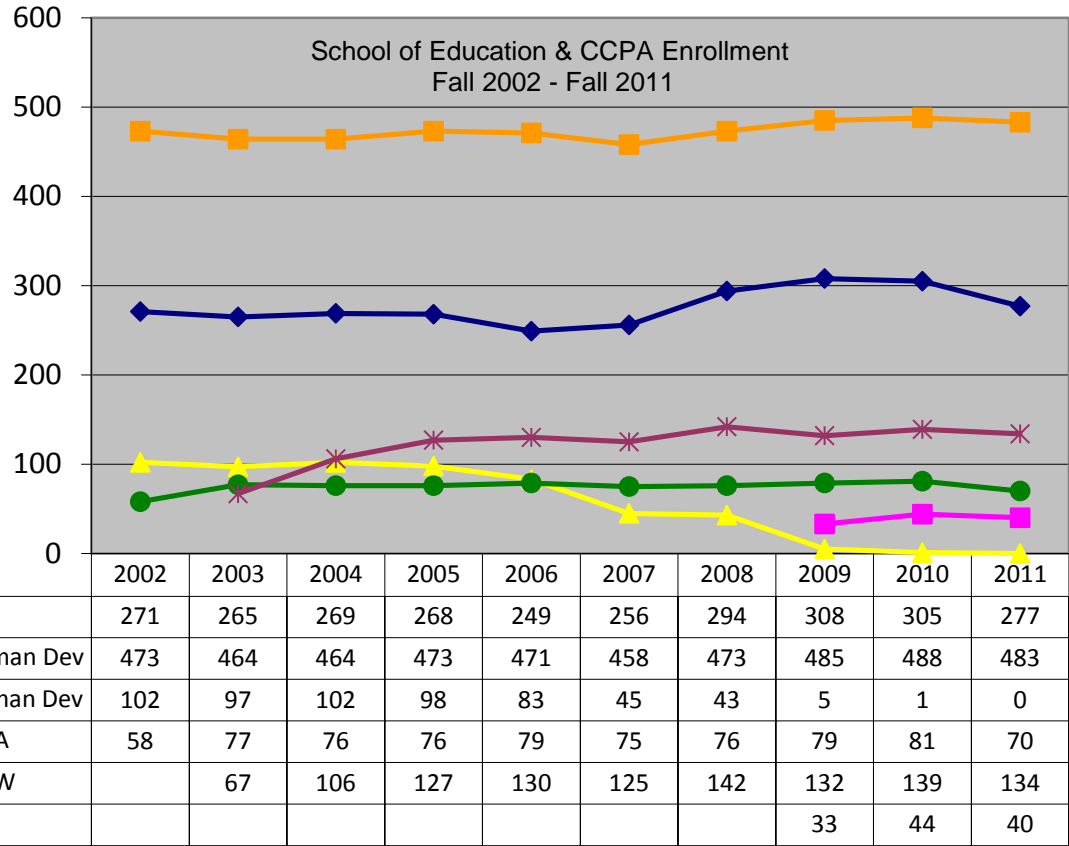
The Masters in Public Administration (MPA) program experienced a relatively large increase in students from Fall 2002 to Fall 2003 (58 to 77 students) and was remarkably stable from Fall 2003 through Fall 2010. The Fall 2011 figure of 70 students is a drop of 11 students (-13.6%) from Fall 2010.

The Masters in Social work (MSW) program began with 67 students in Fall 2003 and grew rapidly to a peak of 142 students in Fall 2008. The Fall 2011 figure of 134 students is exactly double the Fall 2003 figure.

The Masters in Student Affairs Administration is in its second year. Fall 2011 headcount stands at 40; an increase of 21.2% since Fall 2009.

The overall size of the College of Community and Public Affairs in Fall 2011 is 727 students; 483 undergraduates and 244 graduate students.

## Summary

In Fall 2011, Binghamton University's undergraduate enrollment increased slightly from Fall 2010, and stands at 11,861 students. Graduate enrollment declined by 223 from Fall 2010 and stands at 2,885 students. Binghamton University's student body remains very diverse with undergraduate and graduate students coming from a total of 83 different countries. (International undergraduate students came from 55 different countries, while international graduate students represented 64 countries.) Additionally, Binghamton University increased its out-of-state undergraduate enrollment by another 1.3% percent in Fall 2011. Nearly 21% percent of Binghamton's undergraduates were from outside of New York State, while slightly over 37% percent of graduate students were not from New York.
