Only courses passed with a the grade C- or better and only one course taken under the Pass/Fail option may count towards major requirements • No more than six courses from any one subfield (sociocultural, biological or linguistic anthropology or archaeology) may count towards major requirements • A maximum of 4 credits total is allowed of any ANTH 495 and 497/499 courses • No more than two cross-listed courses are allowed • Completion of this degree requires 56 credits, at least 28 credits of which must be taken in Anthropology at Binghamton University.
