THE GALLERY COMMITTEE OPENS THE NEW ART GALLERY IN THE FINE ARTS BUILDING AT THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT BINGHAMTON, HARPUR COLLEGE, WITH AN EXHIBITION OF WORKS BY ROBERT MARX, SUNDAY, JANUARY 15, 1967 - FEBRUARY 10, 1967.

THE FACES OF ROBERT MARX FEEL THEIR ONE SOUND, THEIR WORD-SIGH, THEIR PHRASE OF NEED-THAT IS YOUR OWN. THEY ARE COORDINATING IMAGES -NOT MAN, NOT WOMAN, NOT OLD, NOT YOUNG; THEY ARE THE TOTEMS, THE COMMUNAL SYMBOLS, OF AN OPEN MYTHOLOGY. THERE IS NO FINAL PARAPHRASE THAT WE CAN USE TO DOMESTICATE THEM OR DEFEND OURSELVES AGAINST THEM. THEY HAVE TOTEMIC POWER. IN MYSTERY, IN MAGIC, BY SOME MIRACLE OF ART, THESE FACES ARE RECALLED, REMEMBERED, AS IF ART HAD EXPOSED IN PAIN THAT WHICH HAD ALREADY BEEN CLOSED OVER. THE RESTITUTION INTO FORMAL FEELING IS MADE A HAIRBREADTH FROM WHOLE MADNESS AND DEATH. THESE FACES SUFFER A TERRIBLE KINAESTHETIC HUNGER, AND THEY ARE ASHAMED OF THEIR PAIN. THEY HAVE NO ARMS, NO EYES, NO LOWER BODY. THEY WEAR SHROUDS. THEY CAN HOLD ON ONLY WITH THEIR FACES. LISTENING FOR YOU LIKE ANIMALS, THEY ARE HAUNTED BY THE NIGHTMARISH SOUND OF SOME WINTER GOD. THEY LIVE IN THE WINTER SEASON. THEY FEEL THROUGH THE LANDSCAPE OF THE BLEAK SCANDINAVIAN WINTER FOREST.

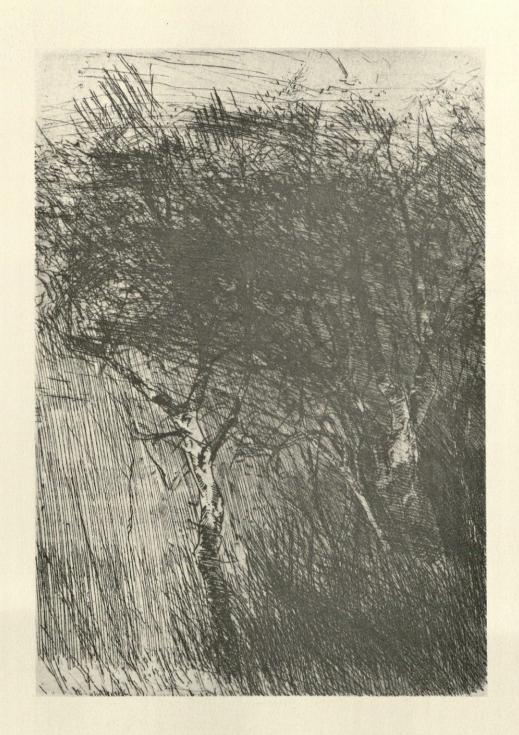
THESE FACES EXPOSE THEMSELVES IN SPITE OF THEIR HORROR AT EXPOSURE. TOUCH THEM AND THEY DIE IN AGONY AND SHAME. SUFFOCATING, THEY GROW THEIR OWN PLACENTAL MASKS, THE FIBRES OF THE PSYCHE CHANGING, ALL OF ITS VIBRATIONS MADE VISUALLY MANIFEST. MAIMED, SELF-MAINED, THESE FACES INVITE YOU TO VIOLATE THEM, INVITE YOU TO COMMIT YOUR SINS AGAIN, INVITE YOU TO DEPRESSION AS A WAY TOWARD PSYCHIC INTEGRATION.

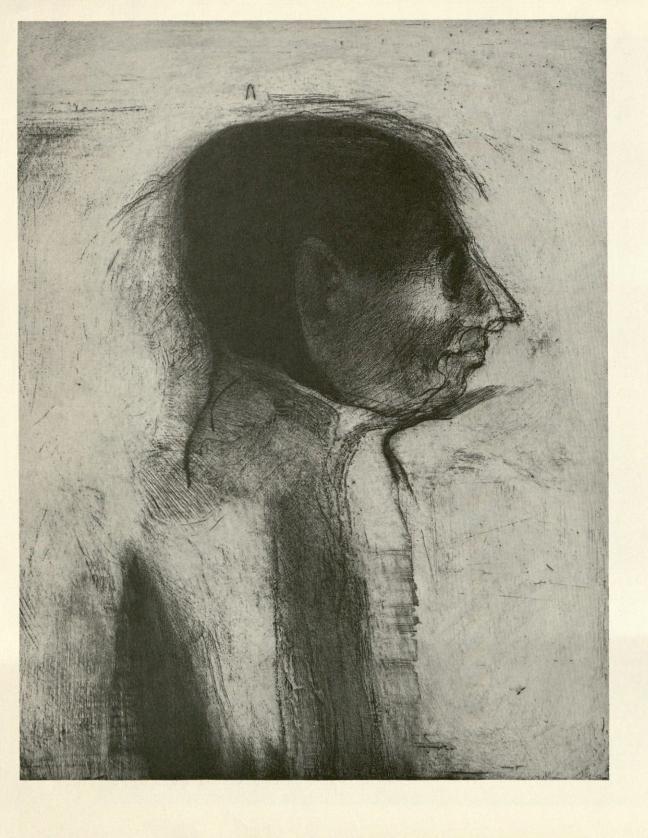

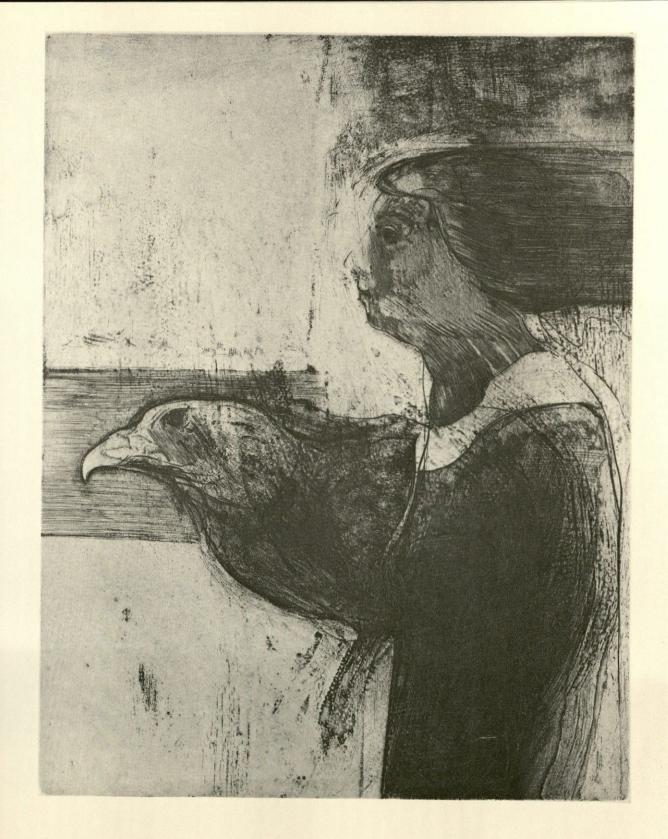

ROBERT E. MARX BORN: Northeim, Germany: 1925, Moved to United States 1927; STUD-IED University of Illinois (architecture then transferred to painting) 1947. One year of study at Heidelberg, Germany, traveling throughout Germany, Austria, Italy, Switzerland and France. Returned to study at University of Illinois where he received his B.F.A. degree, 1951. Continued on as a graduate student (printmaking) and teaching assistant for two years. Awarded M.F.A. degree in 1953. Instructor, University of Wisconsin. Chairman of the Art Department of Flint Junior College, Michigan and, in addition, was appointed Director of the Flint Institute of Art, 1956. Associate Professor in the School of Art, Syracuse University in 1958. Associate Professor at State University of New York at Binghamton, Harpur College in 1966. 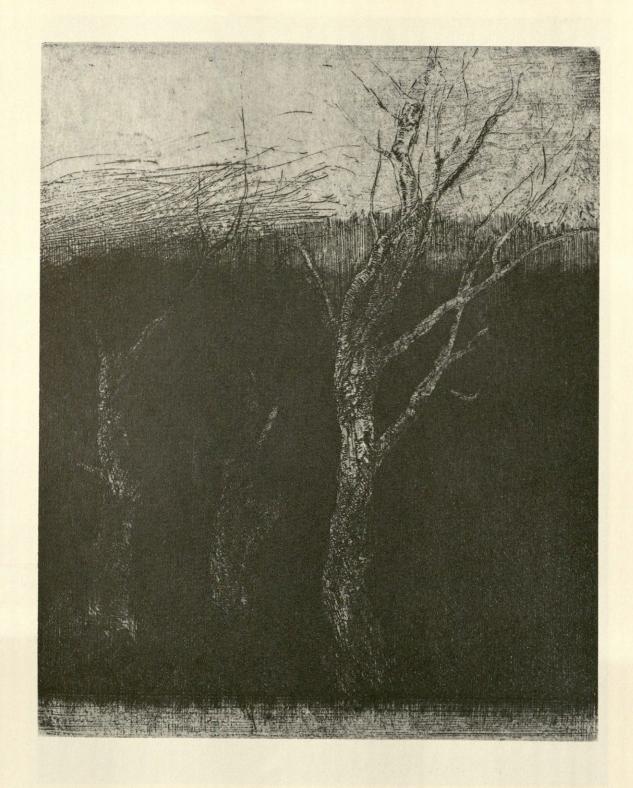






ANNE
