



The inspiration for these sculptures grew out of insights gained during the execution of several commissions Lundertook over the past few years. The works on display are modular in character, constructed in accordance with precise mathematical formulae. On the other hand, my intention was for the works to incorporate random, unplanned and ambiguous elements, all of which exist within the confines of the strict system I had devised. Several of the sculptures are consistently worked-out variations on the conceptual theme behind my first commissioned work: a large, free-standing piece entitled TWO MOD-ULES. In the four COLUMNS (11, 12, 13, 14 in the exhibition), linear elements of the basic module are progressively simplified. In the four triangular floor pieces, MANEUVERS I and II and PYRAMIDS I and II, the modules employed are essentially equivalent, differing only as to the size of the square tubing from which they are made.

Six small reliefs are maguettes and studies for two other commissioned works: a large aluminum relief, FACETS, which has been affixed to a building at Wilkes College, and an aluminum relief, affixed to a private residence in Pennsylvania. In both the commissioned works and the related reliefs, the common module is a wedge-shaped prism, cut at a compound or single angle and revolved in a clockwise position in some cases and a counter-clockwise position in others. The remaining four works, SMALL ALU-MINUM FOREST, MANGROVE, EXTENDERS OUT and BRISTLING, are organized on grids from which rise linear forms, bent at an identical angle. In all four pieces, the sheer accumulation of modular elements is designed to produce a radical visual disorientation in the viewer.

Those unfamiliar with modular art might easily conclude that working with modules, grids and rigid systems would place gratuitous obstacles in the way of sculptors. It is my hope that this exhibition will stand as evidence that such need not be

the case. When a sculptor makes it obvious that he has accepted such restrictions as givens, he provides the viewer with a set of precise points of reference. Having done this, the artist is in a position to work out his formal conceptions with greater rigor, knowing that he has established a framework within which subtle differential features can be identified and appreciated.
