





Lesley Lawton Baroque Diva, drypoint, 8 x 6 inches




Kathleen Kretz Self-portrait, oil on canvas, 40 x 30 inches




David Rosenthal Landscape in Three Marks, silkscreen, 11 x 13-1/2 inches






Catherine Sturdevant Head Study, plastalene, height 12-1/2 inches




Todd Standish "Who's Zoomin" Who," oil on canvas, 48 x 36 inches






Carlos Martinez 8 Blocks, wood, 7 x 17 x 18 inches
