

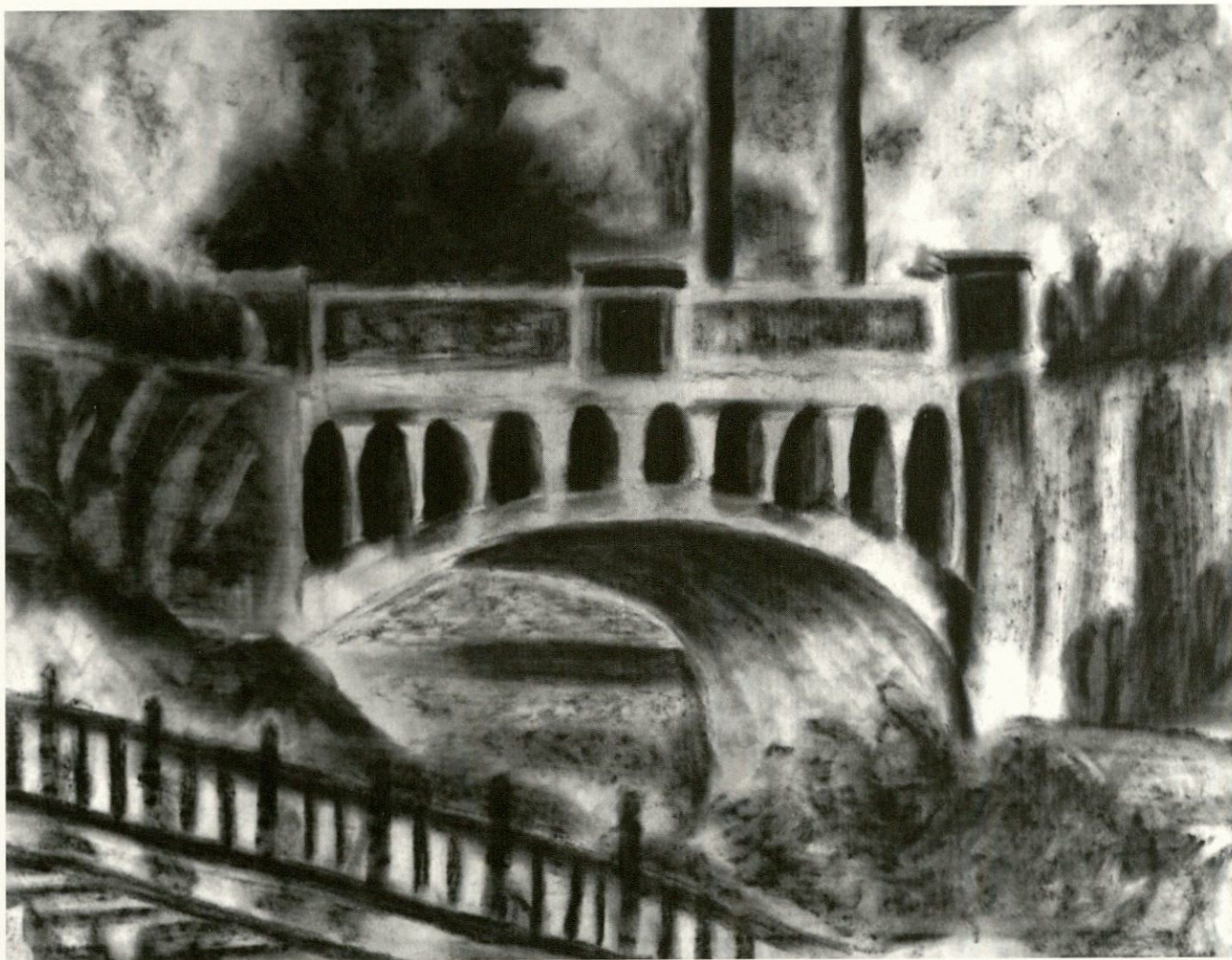

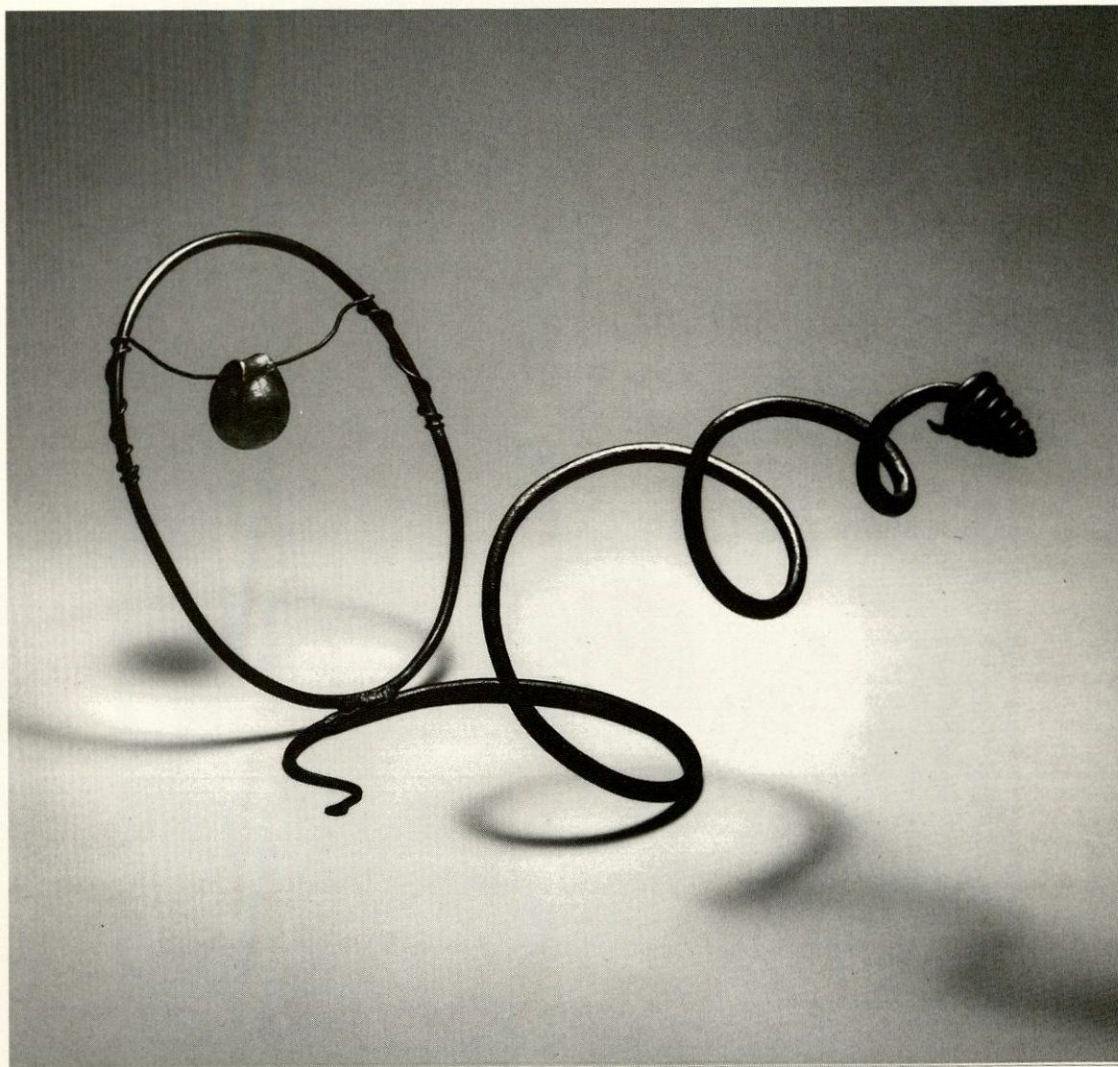

Every year, for the past 24 years, I've stood with various other faculty in the middle of the pre-opening chaos that is required when putting this many pieces of student work up on the walls, and informally taken stock. We can't help it. It's the only time when we see it all together, and we're always proud. Really proud. But this year it's a little different because we can make some objective comparisons.

A little history: Over the last four years, natural (but unusually severe) attrition has cut this faculty in half at a time when there was no money for re-hiring. (Luckily, we have had several exceptional artists to fill in as adjunct faculty.) But now, as the recent New York state financial nightmare recedes, we are able to hire two more full-time faculty to partially replace losses, and are immersed in this process *as this catalog goes to press*. The applicants for these positions (200 of them!) send slides of their students' work, so during the past few weeks, we have seen several thousand slides of student work from first-rate schools. We can't help making comparisons, and what we have seen reinforces our (not *entirely* objective) pride in our students.

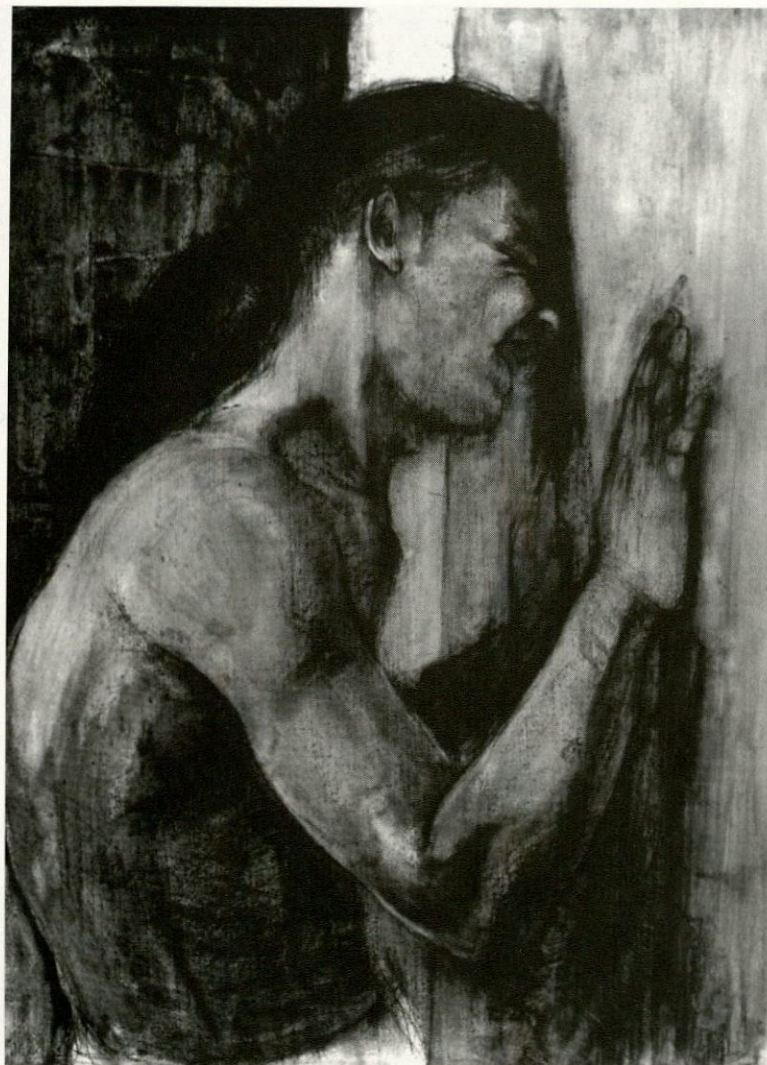

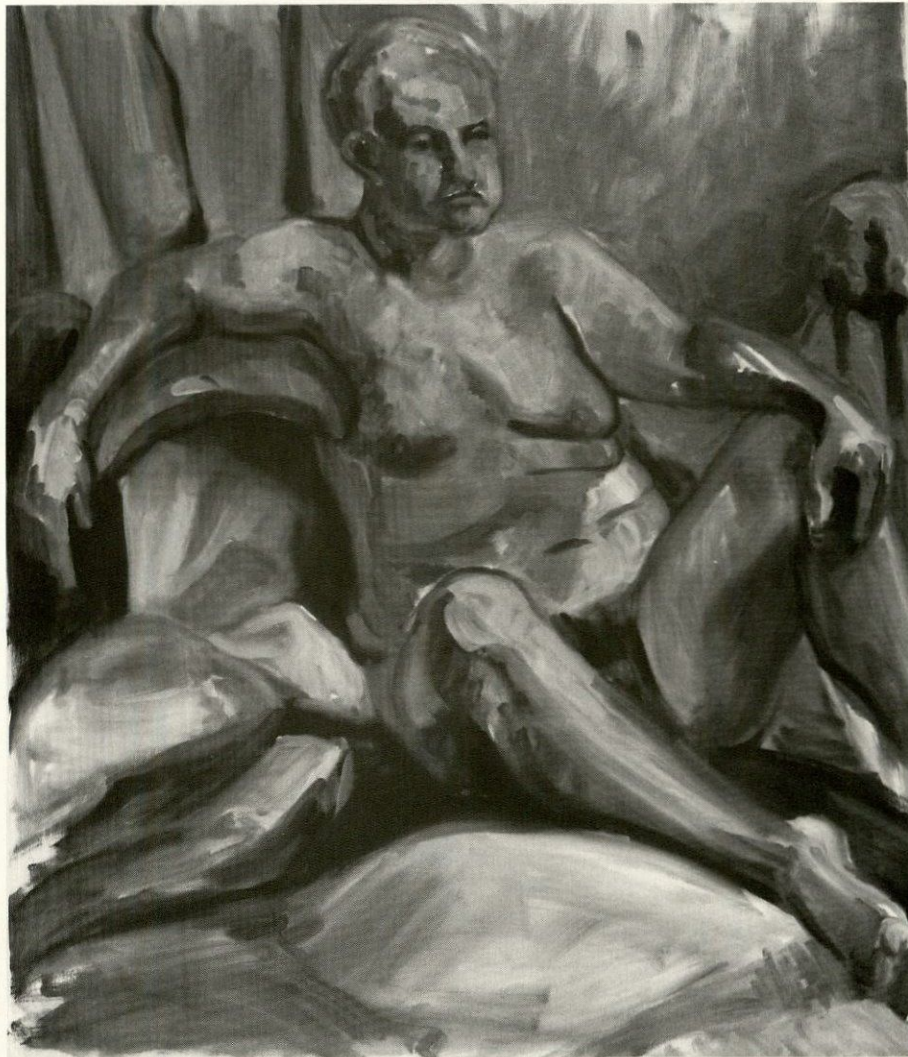


MASUMI FURUDA

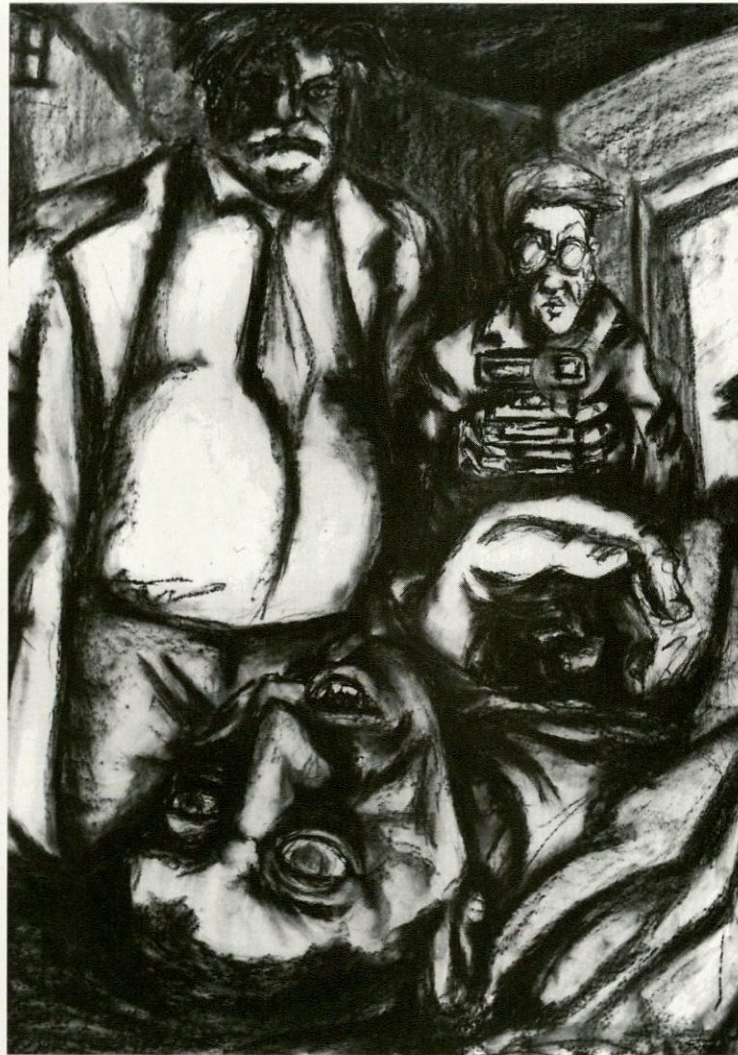

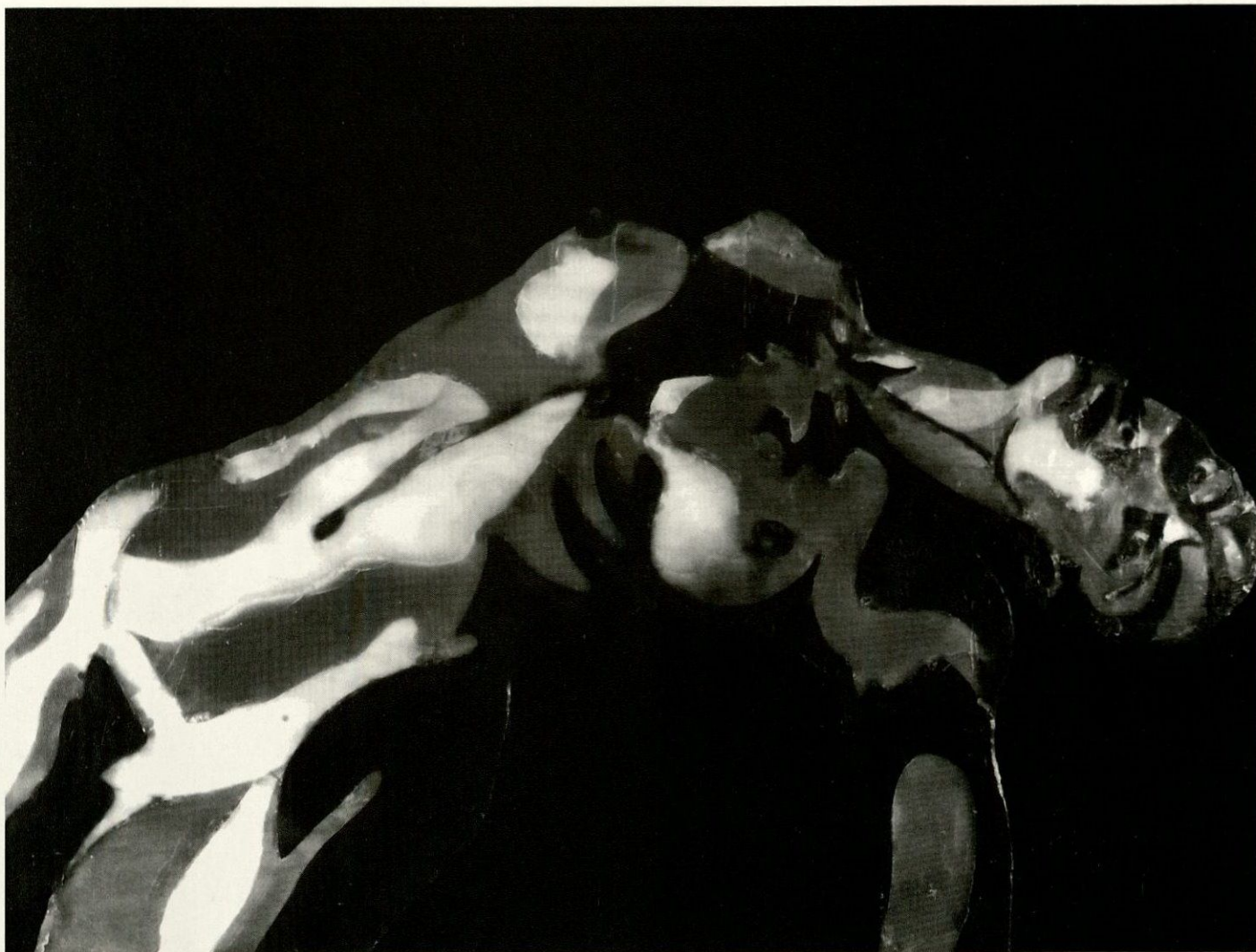

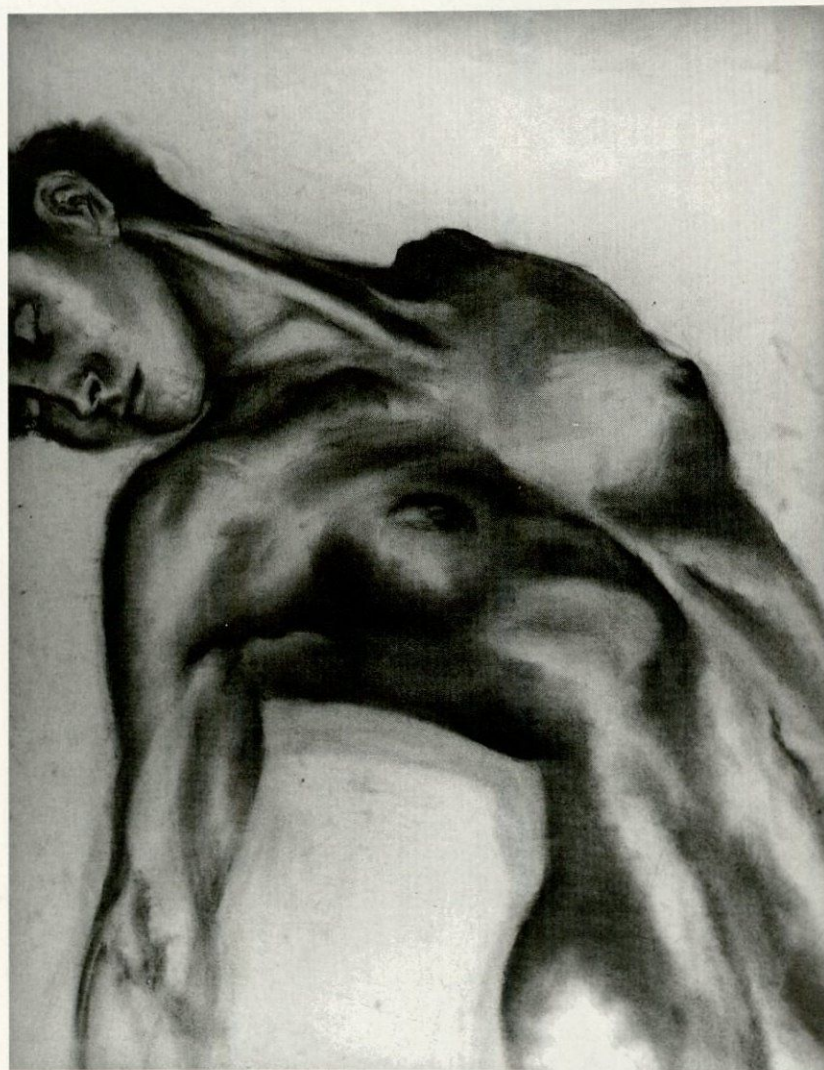

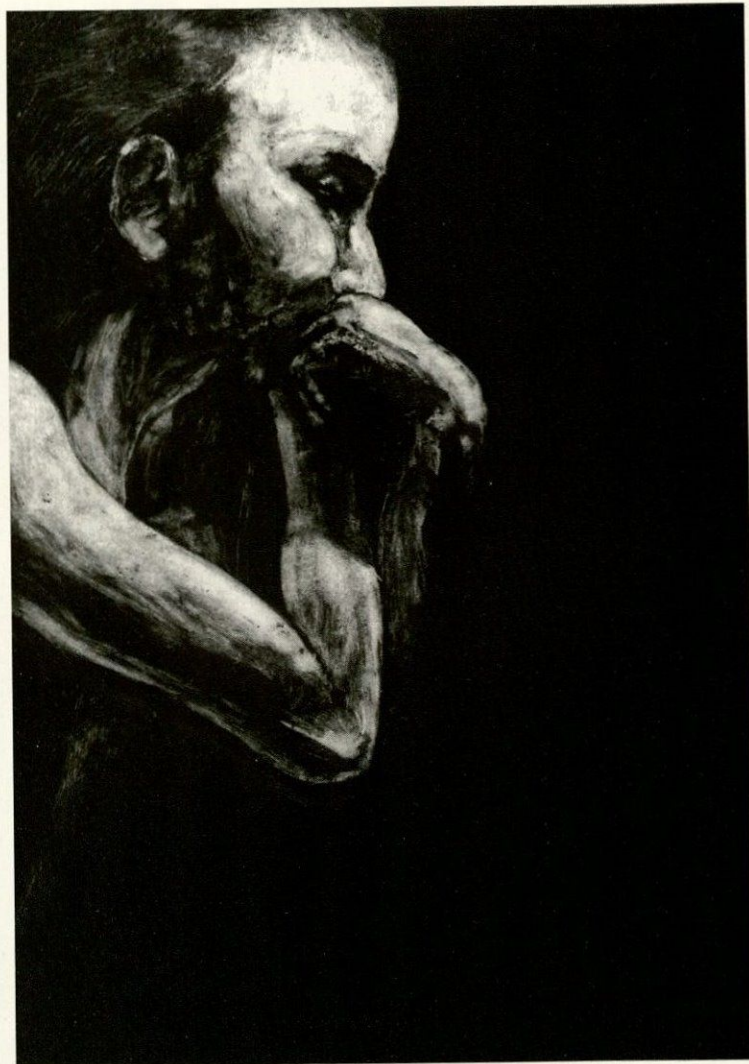
