
Domestic students are reminded that it is ABSOLUTELY IMPERATIVE that you apply for New York State (NYS) residency BEFORE the start of classes. To demonstrate residency you will need a NYS address, a NYS driver's license, and a NYS car registration (if you own a car). International students should plan to visit the office International Student and Scholar Services (ISSS) as soon after their arrival as possible. You are also expected to attend special orientation sessions sponsored by International Student and Scholar Services (ISSS) on **August 16**. You should have received information regarding their schedule directly from that office. Students who have been admitted as PROVISIONAL for English must take the ESL tests for placement purposes.
