Dear CCPA Colleagues,

I hope the summer is treating you well and that you are finding it both productive and relaxing.

I am writing to invite you to apply for a \$5,000 Curriculum Development Grant through the Institute for Genocide and Mass Atrocity Prevention (I-GMAP) to explore ways to apply your existing expertise to the complex but vitally important goal of preventing mass atrocities. I-GMAP applies a campus-wide approach to atrocity prevention. Last year, the faculty who participated in our program came from CCPA, Harpur and Decker. This year, we have already selected faculty from Watson, SOM and Harpur, but we received no applications from CCPA faculty. There are two remaining \$5,000 awards available for the 2019-20 and I am hoping that I can persuade one or more of you to apply.

The official deadline has passed, but I am reaching out now to those CCPA colleagues who are doing work most closely related to the Institute's work to extend a personal invitation. Please see the attached document or click [here](#) for more information. The grant amount is not large (\$5,000) but the program provides an interesting opportunity to meet faculty from across campus as well as practitioners from around the world and to bring some exciting new perspectives to one of your classes. The application process is quick and easy (especially for those of you who are accustomed to other grant proposals); it should take you only 5 minutes to complete.

If you have questions about the awards, please feel free to contact me. You may also wish to talk to David Campbell (copied here) about his experience in last year's program.

Hi Nadia,

It sounds like you are putting together an exciting masters program. Thank you for reaching out to Sociology to explore whether any of our courses might help your students. In general, we would welcome your masters students into our courses. Our graduate level courses are designed for our doctoral candidates, but we also have our own masters students as well as students from other departments on occasion in them that do well.

Let me also give you some information about how we organize our curriculum. We do not have any pre-requisites for courses. However, we do expect students to take a set of core courses (theory, problems of methods and a two course sequence on the history of capitalism), which are offered in the Fall. So most students will come into our more specialized courses offered in the Spring (like the developmental state or the state and social policy course you list below) with that foundation. Students taking courses in the Spring may find that the conversation will be informed by the fall courses. Still I think that students could meaningfully engage in new material.

In addition to the courses you list here, we will likely be offering a range of one time courses, or courses offered every 2-4 years in each of our four substantive clusters:

1. The history of capitalism/political economy
2. Critical studies of labor and migration – for instance next fall we will have a distinguished professor in the field of labor, Van der Linden, from Europe offer a course on labor
3. Critical studies of carceral and surveillance studies
4. Power and the politics of resistance

These courses will most likely be taught in spring and could be of interest to your students, I would imagine.

Hi Nadia,

I'm forwarding an email from David Stahl regarding the courses he teaches that would be appropriate for the GMAP MS students. I teach the Race in Transnational History course that is on your chart. Right now I teach it on a two-year rotation (once every two years). There are no prerequisites for it, but having prior knowledge of basic U.S. and/or global history would be useful.

One other thing I should point is that our DAAAS graduate courses are joint 400/500 level courses. Usually only two seats are set aside for the 500-level section because our graduate enrollment is lower. However, when we've had more interest, some of our instructors have increased those seats. I would be happy to accommodate more than two GMAP MS students in my course.

Hi John,

I teach three graduate courses that would be appropriate for GMAP MA students: AAAS 530 Trauma in JPN Lit & Film, AAAS 531 Unresolved Issues: Wars in Asia & SXX Pacific War Exp in JPN Lit & Film (I still need to get a specific graduate number for this seminar as it used to be taught at the 300-level in years past).

The first course has been offered every year, the second every 2-3 years, and it has been over 5 years since I taught the third. Going forward, I plan to continue offering the first every year and both the second and third once every 2-3 years. I am will to take 1-2 GMAP MA students into these seminars (I have already agreed to accommodate some GMAP undergraduate minors and have 1 in my seminar this semester, although initially 3 were registered. Nadia should know that I cannot accept more than 2-3 students total from GMAP in any given course). The only prerequisite for joining these seminars would be instructor permission.

At the graduate level, IGMAP students would generally find our advanced electives (600-level) appealing - generally speaking, we have space and would welcome IGMAP students.

Hi Mary,

I hope you are having a good start to the semester.

You will recall that Max Pensky and I met with you last year about the possibility of including some of your forensic nursing courses in the curriculum for a proposed new degree in Genocide and Mass Atrocity Prevention. I just wanted to make sure that you were aware of the possibility of receiving some additional funds to support your deliberate attention to atrocity prevention as part of one or more of your classes through one of our curriculum development awards. Below is a copy of a message I sent out not too long ago. We have received some very strong and interesting proposals (as well as some that are not so strong), but nothing from anyone in Decker.
