Areas of Study

An Area of Study consists of four or more courses that cluster together to form a focused curriculum of the student's choice. Areas must be formulated in consultation with and approved by the Judaic Studies Director of Undergraduate Studies.

There is no limit to the range of possible areas of study. Some might include:

Jewish Communal Service Non-Profit Organizations, Jewish Social Ethics, Public Opinion (Poli Sci)	Jewish History Ancient, Between Persians and Islam, Medieval, Early Modern, Modern, History of Israel
Jewish Thought Philosophy of Religion, Faith and Reason, American Jewish Thought	Holocaust Studies History of the Holocaust, Holocaust and Post-Holocaust Literature, Post-Holocaust Jewish Thought
Literature and Culture Israeli Cinema, Hebrew and Yiddish Literature Art History	Individually Designed

The Department of Judaic Studies encourages its students to shape their curriculum around their individual interests and goals for their post-graduate careers.

Note:

* At least 2 of the area courses have to be in the 300-400 level and taken at Binghamton University. (The residency part of this requirement can be adjusted by the Judaic Studies Director of Undergraduate Studies on a case-by-case basis.)

* At least three of the four courses have to be (a) Judaic Studies courses, or (b) cross-listed in Judaic Studies, or (c) approved by a Judaic Studies advisor. The fourth courses can be outside of Judaic Studies and must be approved by a Judaic Studies advisor.

* The Major in Judaic Studies consists of 10 courses and language proficiency. No course can count for more than one category (Core, Area of Study, Elective).
