### 2. New Faculty: Dr. Alan Arkush

JUST is delighted to welcome Dr. Alan Arkush to its faculty. A one-year appointment, Dr. Arkush is a distinguished scholar in Judaic Studies. He earned his B.A. at Cornell, an M.A. at the Jewish Theological Seminary, and his Ph.D. (1987) at Brandeis University. He has taught previously as a Visiting Instructor at Cornell and the University of Texas at Dallas. He recently published an original translation of Moses Mendelssohn's Jerusalem (1782), one of the earliest and most important works in Modern Jewish thought. During the Fall Semester, Prof. Arkush will be offering two courses (see below) and three in the Spring. Dr. Arkush's office is LT 1113. Again, welcome Dr. Arkush!

# 4. Southern Tier Jewish History Project [STJHP]

Under the direction of Lance J. Sussman, Asst. Prof. of American Jewish History, STJHP is currently operating at full steam. More than dozen interviews were conducted this summer with long-term residents and natives of the area. Among the most unusual stories heard was an account of Jewish farm life in Broome County during the 1940s. At least forty Jewish families, refugees fleeing from Hitler, engaged in agricultural pursuits in this area. The archives of the Broome County Historical Society also revealed that a 1919 campaign in the Southern Tier to relieve the Jewish victims of World War I in East Europe netted over \$54,000. Half of the contributions were by George Johnson and family!

Prof. Sussman is currently looking for photographs and other memorabilia depicting Jewish life in Broome County, 1850 to the present. In September, the Senior Citizens Club of the Jewish Community Center will be holding a "Nostalgia Day" to collect their materials. Individuals are also invited to check their attics and family albums in search of "treasure." Lance J. Sussman received his Ph.D. in May, 1987 from HUC-JIR. He studied with Profs. Jacob R. Marcus and Jonathan D. Sarna and wrote a biography of Isaac Leeser (1806-1868), the foremost American Jewish religious leader prior to the Civil War.

    seminar at Hebrew University on "Jewish
    Assimilation in Germany."
  - Faith Rogow a doctoral candidate at SUNY-Binghamton, will be offering a course, "Feminist Thought in Western Religion," this Fall crosslisted with JUST. She is currently completing her dissertation, "A Comprehensive History of the National Council of Jewish Women" and has published several topics on women's topics.
